



**Alan Stuart Goldberg** is a member of the bars of the Commonwealth of Virginia, the State of New York, the District of Columbia, the State of Florida, and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Mr. Goldberg concentrates in the practice of business, administrative, regulatory, and tax law including the delivery of health care and information technology. Mr. Goldberg's introduction to health law and information technology occurred during the dawning of the Medicare/Medicaid programs era as a staff judge advocate and a prosecutor in the United States Navy from 1968 to 1970, and Mr. Goldberg was involved in investigative actions relating to the return of the USS Pueblo and the Sealab project. Mr. Goldberg joined Goulston & Storrs in 1967 as the eleventh attorney in the firm upon graduation from Boston College Law School, where Mr. Goldberg was a member of the Law Review and was selected for the National Moot Court Team and received an academic scholarship, and as a Lecturer in Law presented a course in land finance. In 1978 Mr. Goldberg received an LL.M. (Taxation) from Boston University School of Law. Mr. Goldberg teaches eHealth Care law using distance educational techniques as an Adjunct Professor at the University of Maryland School of Law in Baltimore and at Boston's Suffolk University Law School. Mr. Goldberg is a Past President of the National Health Lawyers Association (1991-1992) and served on the AHLA Board of Directors from 1981 to 1993, and served as an Internet advisor to the Health Lawyers Board. Mr. Goldberg received the National Health Lawyers Association David J. Greenburg Service Award in 1996 and was named an AHLA Fellow in 2005, and received a distinguished alumnus award from Boston College Law School at the 75th anniversary celebration in 2006 of the founding of the law school.

Mr. Goldberg has published on many business, health law, and other legal issues including for the American Bar Association, the American Health Lawyers Association, and the Boston Bar Association including on topics relating to telemedicine, civil and criminal health care regulatory enforcement, assisted living, and long term care financing, and Mr. Goldberg has frequently lectured for the American Bar Association and the American Health Lawyers Association, and also for many other organizations in Virginia, Massachusetts, District of Columbia, Florida, Michigan, South Carolina, London, UK, and elsewhere; and for the Massachusetts Hospital Association, Dental Society, Medical Society, and Long Term Care Foundation; the American Telemedicine

Association; the Health Care Compliance Association; the Workgroup For Electronic Data Interchange; the American Health Care Association; the Healthcare Information and Management Systems Society; the United States Navy; the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services; the District of Columbia AHIMA chapter; the Virginia Bar Association and Virginia Continuing Legal Education; and Mr. Goldberg plans and participates as a moderator and a lecturer in national conferences and teleconferences. Mr. Goldberg participated in obtaining a favorable ruling from the Internal Revenue Service regarding distributable net income and depreciation for estates and trusts and a favorable advisory opinion from the Office of the Inspector General of the US Department of Health and Human Services regarding utility services made available to long term care providers in a group services manner.

Mr. Goldberg was the Editor of a law and computer technology column called "The Computer Wizard" published by the American Bar Association's Business Law Section magazine "Business Law Today"; and Mr. Goldberg is the founding moderator of the American Health Lawyers Association Health Information and Technology Internet listserv. Mr. Goldberg has presented loss prevention seminars relating to technology issues to the membership of Attorneys' Liability Assurance Society. Among Mr. Goldberg's interests include the transactional and financial aspects of health care and related businesses including formation and operation, challenges and opportunities involving the application of technology to the practice of law and medicine and to the delivery of healthcare and in other business areas including issues involving the Internet, security and encryption, privacy and confidentiality, health information networks, software licensing and devices, corporate compliance programs and ethics, regulatory enforcement and civil and criminal defense, health planning including certificate of public need and reimbursement, health information networks, information technology business transactions and taxation, telemedicine, and estate planning.
